

Research Associate Position: Radiation Health Effects (Epidemiology)

We are seeking to hire a research associate to manage two radiation health effects projects. He/she will be supervised by Dr. Paul Villeneuve (<https://carleton.ca/eoel>), with support from a team of researchers at Queen's University, McGill University, and the University of California San Francisco. The position is for two years initially, with possibility of an extension.

Qualifications and Experience:

- Candidates should have some graduate level training in epidemiology
- Candidates should demonstrate prior experience working with health administrative data
- Experience with working with research processes at the Institute of Clinical and Evaluative Sciences (ICES) is an asset.
- Previous experience in managing research projects, writing scientific manuscripts, and coordinating REB submissions is desired
- Candidates should demonstrate strong writing skills
